
Brookhaven announces first police chief

Brookhaven Mayor J. Max Davis has announced Gary Yandura as the city's first police chief. Yandura, a 38-year veteran law enforcement officer, will be tasked

with building Brookhaven's new police department.

"Our first priority is to provide a safe community for Brookhaven's residents and businesses," Davis said. "Chief Yandura's record of reducing crime, building community partnerships and leading with integrity is exactly what Brookhaven needs for us to meet this goal."

Yandura previously served as chief of police in Hiram and College



Yandura started his law enforcement career in Lake Forest, Ill. He is a graduate of the FBI Academy and certified by the Georgia Police Officers Standards and Training Council. He has a master's degree from Roosevelt University in Chicago and a bachelor's degree in criminal justice from the University of Illinois.

"I am excited to have Chief Yandura join our team," said City Manager Marie Garrett. "We received a lot of interest from experienced candidates, but Yandura was the right person to help build a new police department from the ground up." Garrett, who is tasked with making the appointment under Brookhaven's charter, reviewed 98 applications from around the nation and interviewed 10 finalists.

"I am honored to help build a new police department that Brookhaven residents and businesses can be proud of," Yandura said. "I am now working to find a qualified command staff and assessing the community to determine how many officers we need to hire to effectively serve and protect Brookhaven."

Yandura's first day is April 15. Brookhaven currently has an intergovernmental agreement with DeKalb County to provide police services. The goal is to have Brookhaven officers on the road by the end of the summer.


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Mayor's Note...

Despite the recent misinformation some residents may have received via robocalls and postcards, Brookhaven is not seeking a tax increase. The city charter caps the millage rate at 3.35 mills. This summer we will work to have our rate set below that cap. You can also see a letter that State Representative Mike Jacobs, of Brookhaven, sent to Attorney General Sam Olens.

In this document, Rep. Jacobs requests a legal opinion as to the possible illegality of DeKalb County's shifting of funds from the police line item to the county general fund, a move which effectively raised taxes only on residents living in cities.

We have just crossed the first 100 days of history here in our new city of Brookhaven.

The city hosted an education forum last week where several presentations were made concerning the future of education in Brookhaven. Interim DeKalb County Schools Superintendent Michael Thurmond spoke about his work to get the accreditation of our school system secured. Many in attendance were eager to hear Rep. Jacobs speak about legislation that would allow Brookhaven to have its own school system. Former State Senator Dan Weber gave a thorough explanation of the processes involved with the possible implementation of a charter cluster for

our area. It was an informative meeting and we will continue to provide forums like this to ensure our residents are informed about issues impacting our community.

We have also recently hired a Community Development Director – Susan Canon, a Finance Director-Bonnie Kline and a new Communications Director- Megan Matteucci. Please come by City Hall to find out more about how your city is doing and sign up for our weekly email newsletter.

Brookhaven approves first operating budget

The Brookhaven Mayor and City Council voted unanimously March 26 in support of a \$16.465 million budget for 2013.

The budget includes operating expenses for the city, including administration, police, parks and recreation, community development, public works, legal and other city services. This includes money to establish Brookhaven's own police department.

The budget does not include a final tax rate. The Council set a temporary 3.35 millage rate, but will work to decrease that rate during mid-year budget adjustments in the summer.

"We are committed to maintaining a lean and fiscally responsible budget," Brookhaven Mayor J. Max Davis said. "We are waiting to receive the tax digest and HOST credit figures from DeKalb County, but will continue to work diligently to obtain the lowest millage rate possible."

Brookhaven's city charter prohibits the Council from raising the millage rate above 3.35 mills.

The budget is contingent on the city receiving revenue from DeKalb County, as well as franchise fees from Georgia Power. The city's revenue for this first year budget will be significantly less than future years because the city is not drawing from a full year of operations.

Brookhaven anticipates receiving \$5 million in real property tax, \$400,000 in personal property tax and \$350,000 in motor vehicle tax, along with \$1.8 million in business and occupation tax and \$1.3 million in franchise fees.

"This budget is a work in progress and contingent on revenue from DeKalb County," Davis said. "Our goal remains the same: for Brookhaven taxpayers to pay equal or less than their previous tax rate while receiving quality city services."

Mayor and Council members throw out first pitches

Brookhaven Mayor J. Max Davis officially kicked off the start of the Little League season March 8 at Murphey Candler Park. The Mayor threw out the first pitch, starting the baseball season.

The Mayor, District 1 Councilwoman Rebecca Chase Williams and District 3 Councilman Bates Mattison threw out the first pitches March 9 to start the girls' softball season. This is the 55th

Little League season and 45th girls' softball season at Murphey Candler.
