Brookhaven will host a birthday celebration at Blackburn Park, 3493 Ashford Dunwoody Road, on Sat., Dec.14 from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m.

The Saturday birthday celebration will include live music, food trucks, children's entertainment and activities throughout

the day. At dusk, the mayor and council will light the city's first Christmas tree, a 12-foot evergreen planted recently in Blackburn Park.

Dear Neighbors,

I am honored to invite you to celebrate Brookhaven's oneyear anniversary. We will be having a birthday celebration Saturday, Dec. 14 from 1-6 p.m. at Blackburn Park. This will be a fun event for families..

We also will host a formal incorporation commemoration at 7 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 17 on the green at Town Brookhaven to honor those who helped found the city. Brookhaven would not exist without the grassroots efforts from a number of volunteers who dedicated themselves to the formation of our great city. I thank each and every one of you who made this city possible and will be forever indebted to your service. The City of Brookhaven opened for business on Dec. 17, 2012. Since then, we have had numerous successes and milestones, including:

- More than doubling police coverage over prior County levels
- Assuming the maintenance of our parks
- Opening and staffing our municipal court
- Setting our millage rate one half mill below our cap
- Filling and repairing more than 110 potholes
- · Completing 485 public works orders
- Repairing our sidewalks
- Handling 541 traffic accidents
- Issuing 1,316 new business licenses
- Issuing over 135 single family building permits
- Creating a \$1 million reserve

This is just the beginning. Brookhaven was created with the promise of limited and efficient government that reduces your share of the tax burden and spends your tax dollars wisely. With this in mind, we have recently begun sidewalk installations and paving projects in each district this year ahead of schedule. AED Donation to Help Brookhaven Save Lives

Brookhaven will be able to save more lives and money thanks to a new nonprofit organization.

The Friends of Brookhaven Foundation has pledged to help raise funds to purchase portable automated external defibrillators (AEDs) for all Brookhaven Police patrol

cars, as well as city hall, municipal court and city recreation facilities.

The city has agreed to match each dollar raised by the Friends of Brookhaven Foundation, reducing the expense for the city. AEDs can typically cost between \$900 and \$1,200 per device.

"AED devices are life-saving and absolutely necessary in an emergency. If having these in our public facilities and

patrol cars saves at least one life, it will have been worth the cost," Mayor J. Max Davis said. "We are very proud of the foundation and their donors who have raised \$20,000 of their \$30,000 goal, and encourage everyone to make their own donation before the deadline."


The funds will be presented to the city on its birthday: December 17.

New locations for Brookhaven city hall and police offices



Brookhaven will move out of the temporary city hall administrative offices at Ashford North in Dunwoody to a new location -in Brookhaven's city limitspossibly as soon January, on Peachtree Road.

The city has entered into a verbal agreement and is finalizing negotiations with owners of the former Georgia State University building on Peachtree Road.

"I'm pleased that our latest city hall will be centrally located in Brookhaven and no more than three miles away from any resident," said Brookhaven Mayor J. Max Davis.

The Brookhaven Police Department will also be moving to a new location at 2665 Buford Highway, although contract details are still being finalized for that location as well.

The Brookhaven Municipal Court will remain at its current location at 2 Corporate Boulevard, Suite 125.

Parks Plantings: Trees, Tulips and Pansies

The newest addition to Blackburn Park was planted last week and will be fully decorated and lit on December 14 in honor of Brookhaven's 1st city birthday.



At Blackburn park, it was a family affair as Mayor J Max Davis and Council member Bates Mattison brought their families to help plant tulips and pansies.

Led by Council Member Rebecca Chase Williams, volunteers planted some 3,000 tulip bulbs and 1800 pansies at the entrances to all of Brookhaven's 13 parks. Brookhaven paid for the plants, but the Mayor and City Council joined volunteers from throughout the city to add the fall and spring color to all Brookhaven parks. "It is just a way to show some park pride as we start to take over our parks," said Williams. "We have great Friends of the parks groups who came out to help."



Sidewalks And Paving Under Way

Brookhaven will get new sidewalks and paved roads starting as early as this month. The Brookhaven City Council announced sidewalk and paving plans last month and the council approved an amended 2013 budget with \$400,000 to build new sidewalks. The Mayor and Council selected locations in each district to ensure improvements will be made throughout the city

"We are excited to improve walkability and to connect people to their parks and other neighborhoods," Mayor J. Max Davis said. "Part of the vision for building our city was to spend our tax money in ways that benefit our Brookhaven neighborhoods."

Weather permitting, the city will begin paving five streets before the end of the month. About \$200,000 of Brookhaven HOST money will fund this initial paving. An additional \$1.8 million of HOST money has been set aside for paving in the proposed 2014 budget. Those locations will be selected based on data from the laser truck analysis conducted earlier this year.

An additional \$500,000 is recommended for sidewalk construction in the proposed 2014 budget, totaling close to \$1 million in pedestrian improvements – all within Brookhaven's first two years.

Rebecca Williams – City Finances

There was much to celebrate in our first full year's budget. The expected revenue of \$26.6 million dollars surpassed the \$23.8 million predicted by the Carl Vinson Institute feasibility study even after the city's millage rate was below the county's tax rate. One of our proudest accomplishments was to lower property taxes by more than two mills lower than the county's rate and a half mill below the cap set by the city's charter. The additional revenue appears to be coming from higher than expected revenue for business/occupation licenses, hotel-motel taxes, and building permits.

Our proposed budget includes both general funds and HOST funds. The largest items are \$5.8 million for Police and \$3.8 million for Public Works (including \$1 million for road resurfacing, and another \$1 million for sidewalks.) Parks are allotted \$3.2 million and Community Development goes up to \$2.2 million that includes the addition of four code and building inspectors to handle Brookhaven's building boom. \$6.7 million is set aside for Reserves and Future projects.

At a recent city council meeting, the city announced \$215,000 in parks grants, using money from the 2013 budget and designed for year-end improvements in all of the city parks. The grants included \$65,000.00 for bathrooms and improvements to the ball fields, \$40,000 for an entry feature at Brookhaven Park, \$25,000 for improvements at Lynwood Park, \$25,000 to repair the main pavilion at Blackburn Park, \$10,000 for a new swing set at Ashford Park, \$15,000 to help fund a new bathroom at Briarwood Park, \$5,000 for Georgian Terrance Park, and \$10,000 to install additional dog stations in all the parks.

It is an exciting time in Brookhaven, sawdust is flying, dirt is turning and properties in the City are being transformed into new upscale homes at a dizzying rate. Drive down any street in District 2 and you will see one, two, three or more new homes under construction and families anxiously looking forward to a new life in their dream home. Brookhaven has recently added experienced staff to the Community Development department to handle the fast pace; has increased our contract inspector staff to accommodate needs for both increased construction inspections and general code enforcement; has brought in additional staff to confirm our zoning map is a true and accurate representation of the zonings we inherited from DeKalb County, all necessary to ensure residents receive an adequate level of service from the City of Brookhaven.

The changes that are happening in Brookhaven are truly an exciting thing. Effectively managing those changes is our goal now and into the future.

Bates Mattison – Vision of Economic Development


Economic development is critical to the continued success of our city. Joe Gebbia – Apartment Inspections Brighten Buford Highway

There are several exciting initiatives that promise to bring the Buford Highway corridor to its full potential. A contract has been awarded to develop a master plan for the entire length of the city's Buford Highway corridor. Given its great location, access to the interstates, the city of Atlanta, and beautiful skyline views, Buford Highway is often considered a "diamond in the rough." The city's goal is to encourage smart urban development and to create economic incentives to attract developers.

Because so many of the city's multi-family complexes are located in the fourth district, I am pleased that the city has an Apartment Inspection Program underway, in which the city is inspecting all 66 of the city's complexes to ensure they are meeting building and safety codes. Our inspectors have discovered everything from meter rooms filled with flocks of chickens to standing water in electrical rooms to large holes in roofs and doors. To date, 12 complexes have been inspected and have begun significant improvements new roofs, windows, stairways, and doors as well as new paint and pressure washing. Each apartment owner receives a full report of any problems discovered, and life safety issues are given highest priority.

The construction along Buford Highway continues as the Georgia Department of Transportation is finishing its \$12 million in safety improvements along this major corridor with added sidewalks, safer crosswalks, new lighting and upgraded medians. Another important sidewalk addition will soon be installed by the city of Brookhaven along Curtis Drive to provide a safe path that is ADA compliant for the many students who walk to school at both Woodward Elementary and Cross Keys High School.
