

Paving, Parks & Progress

Residents and visitors to Brookhaven are seeing a lot of activity in the city limits this summer. Following years of planning, the City is rapidly moving forward with projects this year.

In early June the first loads of asphalt were delivered to Woodsdale Road, which kicked off a record-breaking paving project the City is undertaking this year.

In April, the Brookhaven City Council approved a \$4.72 million contract for road paving, the most aggressive in City history. Since Brookhaven's inception, 18.8 percent of the City's 120 miles of roads have been repaved. With an additional 10.7 miles of resurfacing,

rehabilitation or reconstruction planned in 2017, nearly 28 percent of Brookhaven's City roads will be less than 4 years old.

"Maintaining our road infrastructure, after many years of neglect, is a crucial factor for the long-term success of Brookhaven, said City Manager Christian Sigman. "It's a quality



of life issue for our residents, it's a public safety issue for

first responders, and it's an economic development issue for our business community."

Pedestrians should note that Brookhaven recently completed 800

feet of new sidewalk on East Roxboro Road from North Druid Hill Road to Roxboro Road. More sidewalk work is underway at Woodrow Way, Dresden Drive and Coosawattee Drive.

It wouldn't be summer without taking a look at our parks. The pools feature new shade structures and water features, and after completing individual master plans for nearly all our city parks last year, residents can expect to see progress on the new Skyland Park, Georgian Hills Park and Murphey Candler open space in the near future.

"This is an exciting time for parks in Brookhaven," said Parks & Recreation Director Brian Borden. "Our parks are getting better every year, and it's all for our residents, and a result of their input."

You'll see notices all summer about upcoming City paving projects on neighbor-

hood streets and major roadways. City Council recently approved the largest paving project in Brookhaven's history. This record-setting amount of work will be a return on investment for taxpayers - better roads lead to less wear-and-tear on your car, improve your quality of life and help bring economic development to the community.

We are also rolling up our sleeves on critical water-



shed issues. Right now, on Osborne Road crews are working on the first phase of a major drainage improvement project that will mitigate flooding in the area.

It wouldn't be fitting without talking about the improvements and enhancements at our parks to help you cool off during the summer sizzle.

We have great new shade structures at the Murphey Candler and Briarwood pools, and a cool new waterfall feature at Murphey Candler. This summer you

will also see construction start on the new Skyland Park, a walking track and half-court basketball court in Georgian Hills, and the new open space area in Murphey Candler.

As a City, we made a pledge to our residents to not only enhance our current parks but to add greenspace acreage. I'm proud that we were able to move ahead on the Peachtree Creek Greenway that will ultimately connect us to PATH 400 and the Atlanta Beltline.

We also purchased the 33 acres of greenspace near the PDK airport. This is an exciting milestone for our residents who have worked tirelessly for years to preserve this green and vibrant environment. I know I'm looking forward to exploring this greenspace with my sons when it opens this fall.



City Vision and Mission

The following are vision and mission statements crafted and adopted by the Mayor and Council during their council retreat in 2015. Vision

Brookhaven will be nationally recognized as a beautiful community where multiple generations can live in safety, flourish in business and succeed in a historic, sustainable environment with exceptional education and transportation options.

Mission

In support of the Brookhaven vision the City government shall: encourage and maintain a beautiful community, meet public safety needs, develop an environment for business success, promote sustainable projects and activities, identify and preserve historic and neighborhood resources, facilitate educational opportunities, and improve transportation conditions, connectivity, and options while listening to and communicating with the public.

Curbing 101

Curbing is required on all streets and must be furnished and installed by the applicant unless grassed swales are used for water quality control and approved by the public works department.

- The minimum classes and types of curbing permitted are:
- 1. Granite curbing, class D or better.
- 2. Other as approved by the public works director.

In addition to permit requirements, no person shall remove, damage, haul away or cause misalignment of any granite curbing on public streets, including radius curb and catch basin stones, for any reason without first receiving written permission from the City. Granite curbing on public streets are city property.

Upon conviction in municipal court, any person who violates the City's curb code can be fined up to \$500 per linear foot. Each linear foot will be considered a separate offense.

City launches web page for open records requests

The public now has an easier way to request open records from Brookhaven. The Brookhaven City Clerk's office has launched a "JustFOIA" portal, allowing users to fill out automated forms online.

The new web portal and software will track requests as they progress, users will receive an email confirmation and notifications, and will be able to check the status of requests online. While the usual fees for open records will still apply, there will be no additional fee for the online service.

Book highlights Historic Brookhaven

"Every house has a story." That's the premise behind *The Storied Houses of Historic Brookhaven*, a historical account of the early homes of the Historic Brookhaven neighborhood by Brookhaven resident and architect Richard J. Diedrich.

Concerned with the loss of some original homes, some of the residents of the neighborhood, designated a National Historic District in the mid-80s, formed a committee to raise money to produce the book through advance book sales and sponsorships from local businesses and the community.

Diedrich spent the past three years researching the remaining original homes, walking the neighborhood to take pictures of the homes and painting watercolors depicting some of the facades. The book also includes current and vintage photographs of the homes, the Capital City Club and nearby Peachtree Road, Brookhaven's early business district.
