A Message from the Mayor and Mayor-Elect

It has been an honor and an incredible experience to have served on Brookhaven's first city council and then as its second mayor. It hasn't been easy birthing a new city and there have been some stumbles. But I'm proud of the city we have started and look forward to it getting even better.



It took a lot of time to start the

city—to hire all the people it takes to run a city, passing the first code of ordinances, finding a city hall—all while the city was exploding in growth. While we set up our city in record time, lawsuits and controversies were a drain and a distraction. Still, we learned from mistakes and I worked hard to ensure that our city operated with openness and honesty.

As I look back on the last three years, I'm proud of our accomplishments: a first-class police department, nearly 20 miles of roads paved, several miles of sidewalks that better connect our city and millions spent on our parks, recreation centers and pools to correct the years of neglect. Budgets are tight but I'm proud we rolled back the property tax rate three years in a row.

We have spent much of these first years creating master plans for our city, our parks, our roads, Buford Highway, a Bike, Pedestrian and Trail plan, Murphey Candler Lake, the Peachtree Creek Greenway, and most recently the Ashford Dunwoody Corridor. The next few years will be spent implementing these plans, and I'm proud to have helped lay the foundation.

I want to thank the more than 150 citizens whom we've appointed to our 20-plus boards and committees who have provided great input. The countless citizens who have attended town halls, council sessions and public meetings have been the heartbeat of our city.

New leadership will be good for the city but I will stay involved as a citizen. I hope to bring some of my initiatives to fruition, in particular, the history project, restoring Flowerland and beautifying Peachtree Road along the MARTA wall. I wish the new mayor all the best, but you haven't seen the last of me.

Hi, I'm John Ernst and thanks to the residents of our new city, I was elected in early November to become Brookhaven's next mayor. I officially take office on Jan. 4, and am excited to work for—and with—every Brookhaven resident.

Since the election, everyone's first question has been, "What are you going to do first?" I reply with

an answer that may not be shocking, but it is important: "the basics." We can only look at more lofty ambitions as a city once we get a handle on the basics.

Whether it's parks, paving or police, our residents deserve nothing less than efficient and effective services. I will immediately review and suggest action on stormwater and zoning issues that require our attention before they become costly long-term problems.

I also believe it's time to create a truly collaborative government. In addition to limiting meetings closed to the public to only those legally required, I'm committed to engaging all residents in new ways.

Once in office, I'll schedule monthly town hall meetings. Stay tuned for dates so you can share your ideas and suggestions to address our most pressing concerns.

In the meantime, I'll hold two "Coffee with John" meetings in December. On Dec. 10, I'll be at the Cambridge Park Starbucks from 7 to 9 a.m., and on Dec. 17 I'll be at the Cherokee Plaza Starbucks from 7 to 9 a.m. Stop by for a cup and share your insights.

Also, the city relies on resident volunteers for committee positions to help direct our city's goals and operations. Many positions are expiring shortly or will become vacant over my term. Perhaps you or someone you know is just the right candidate to help the city.



The following are vision and mission statements crafted and adopted by the Mayor and Council during their council retreat in 2014.


Vision



Citizens can report issues via Brookhaven Connect

The City of Brookhaven now offers "Brookhaven Connect," a free smart phone app for citizens to report non-emergency problems like potholes, code violations or sidewalk issues. The app is currently available for iPhone and Android phones.

The app is powered by CitySourced, first introduced to Brookhaven residents in March. "Brookhaven Connect" is an updated and more localized version of the CitySourced



"Brookhaven Connect" is not intended for issues that need to be addressed immediately. For downed trees across roads, traffic signals on flash or dark, or downed stop signs, citizens should call the Public Works main number 404-637-0540 and press "1" to connect

to on-call staff. Citizens should call 911 for all public safety emergencies that require police, fire or EMS.

City Council OKs P-card policy

The Brookhaven City Council on Oct. 27 approved a purchasing card policy that will help make the city more efficient as well as provide tight controls on spending.

The new policy mirrors the state's policy, and will mean purchases will be tax exempt, can be monitored in real time by the city's designated card administrator; and certain vendors and items can be blocked.

Only nine Brookhaven city employees and no elected officials have purchasing cards. The spending limits vary by department.

"The key to this is accountability," said Finance Director Carl Stephens.
Users will be able to submit receipts online, and the city's card administrator will have the ability to shut cards down at any time.


