

Brookhaven selects location for new public safety facility

The Brookhaven City Council executed a contract to conduct architecture and engineering work for Brookhaven's new public safety facility on the 19-acre tract of land at 1793 Briarwood Road. The new police building will be next to the signature trailhead for the Peachtree Creek Greenway (PCG) and will be the new home for Brookhaven Police, Municipal Court and Emergency Operations Center.

"This is a landmark day for the City of Brookhaven," said Mayor John Ernst. "This parcel is already set to be the focal point of the PCG, and resolves our search for our new public safety facility, which ensure that our police and court system have all of the resources to provide the best service to residents, including walking to work if they want to."

"Locating the public safety facility at the trailhead gives us a lot of flexibility to do some really exciting things, like fostering destination tourism," said District 4 Councilman Joe Gebbia. "Most of all, the proximity of the police to the PCG will provide enhanced security for the area, which is always a top priority."

For the PCG, the 19-acre parcel provides greenspace, the trailhead, parking and ADA access. The buildout is funded via hotel/motel tax receipts, signed into law in May 2017. For public safety, the building will house Brookhaven Police, Municipal Court and Emergency Operations, and is funded via SPLOST, approved by voters in November 2017. The \$2 million cost for the property itself was covered in an agreement with Children's Healthcare of Atlanta.

The PCG Master Plan outlines a series of nature trails, paved multi-purpose paved trails, and paved promenade trails which will connect Brookhaven's three-mile portion along the North Fork of Peachtree Creek into the 12.3-mile Peachtree Creek Trail project from Mercer University in unincorporated DeKalb to the PATH400 trail, the South Fork Conservancy Trails and the Atlanta Beltline. The PCG will also provide connectivity to areas beyond as part of a larger network of multi-use trails to residences, offices, restaurants, bike rental stands, coffee shops and picnic areas.

"There is a synergy that we can leverage by having the police department and the PCG trailhead in close proximity. Restrooms and meeting spaces can be included in the construction of the overall project which can serve police as well as the walkers and bikers making their way to Children's Healthcare of Atlanta, Emory's facilities at Executive Park, the City of Atlanta, and destinations beyond," said City Manager Christian Sigman.

"A trail with its own public safety building is incredible," said Betsy Eggers, chairperson of Peachtree Creek Greenway, Inc. "Additionally, having a trailhead with restrooms, water fountains and plenty of park-

The new public safety building will provide state-of-the-art amenities and room to grow for Brookhaven Police, which is now crowded into a rented building near the Atlanta city limits. The current facility at 2665 Buford Highway only has 55 parking places for a department with 85 employees and a busy municipal court

"We are busting at the seams, with very little room for police officers, cars or equipment," said Police Chief Gary Yandura. "The building we are in now doesn't even have adequate backup electricity when the power goes out. The new facility will address all of these issues and give us a little room to grow over the next 20-30 years."

The public safety portion of the tract will total 3 to 4 acres out of the 19-acre total, including parking. The City has awarded a contract in the amount of \$800,000 to Rosser International, Inc., for architecture and engineering, which will be followed by a competitive bid process for the actual construction. The total cost will be no more than the \$12 million limit on the SPLOST proceeds, and construction is expected to be complete in the summer of 2020.



Sidewalk program steams through 2018

The City of Brookhaven is continuing its aggressive 2018 construction season by funding additional sidewalks throughout the City. More than two miles of new footpaths will be available for walkers when all are complete.

"These sidewalk projects are another step in the right direction to make Brookhaven a greener and more pedestrian friendly place to live, work and play," said Brookhaven Mayor John Ernst.

Three sidewalk projects were on track to be completed by the end of May, adding an additional 3,600 linear feet of sidewalk to the City sidewalk inventory along Mill Creek Road, Cartecay Drive, and Lanier Drive.

All three of these projects began in early April with the selected contractor, DAF Concrete Inc., aggressively pursuing completion.

The Mill Creek Road project began April 16 and spans 1,200 feet from Johnson Ferry Road, and ends immediately east of the bridge passing Knoll Haven Drive.

The 800-foot sidewalk on Cartecay Drive is now complete, connecting Sylvan Circle to the intersection

of Cartecay, Ellijay and Coosawatee drives.

The 1,600 linear feet of sidewalk along Lanier Drive connects to the existing network established along Lanier Road and Woodrow Way and extends to Windsor Parkway.

In addition to these three sidewalks, the Brookhaven City Council has also approved six additional sidewalk projects which add another mile to the City sidewalk inventory. These six sidewalks, which are already under construction, will be installed along Childers Road (375'), Tryon Road (1,000'), Old Johnson Ferry Road (1,000), North Druid Hills Road (500'), Lanier Drive (850') and Caldwell Road (1,300).

All of these projects are in addition to the three sidewalk projects which were completed earlier this year at Lanier Drive, Skyland Drive, and Drew Valley, totaling 2,290 feet.

"Sidewalks connect places and people. I am proud to say that Brookhaven will have two more miles of sustainable transportation options by this summer," said Mayor Ernst.

Community Development launches Project Portal

The City of Brookhaven now offers online development services to contractors and residents through a new online portal on its website, www.BrookhavenGA.gov/CommDev.

Electronic applications and plan submittals, payments, scheduling inspections, and tracking the status

of projects can all be done through the portal.

"We're always striving to make our processes more efficient for our residents, businesses and staff," said Mayor John Ernst. "This is another step toward making Brookhaven more business-friendly."

The Project Portal will provide multiple advantages to users, among them:

- Submitting plans, and documents electronically, instead of the expense and inconvenience of printing and submitting multiple sets of paper plans
- Applying for building permits, land development permits, land use petitions, and administrative permits online instead of at City Hall
- Downloading plan review comments and approved plans from the portal
- Making fee payments online
- Scheduling inspections from a mobile device 24/7
- Checking permit status and inspection results



from the field at the user's convenience

- Receiving email notifications about review comments, permit approvals, code enforcement case updates, and inspection results
- Viewing open permits, zoning cases, and code enforcement cases on the portal map

Project Portal users will be required to register for a portal account to use these services.

"The new Project Portal provides greater convenience, expediency, cost savings, and better communication to applicants. We think it will be a game changer for our customers," said Patrice Ruffin, Community Development Director. "We're bringing modern technology to our services to make complex processes much easier and more efficient – and we'll be open for business 24/7."



Enjoy the outdoors; avoid hosting mosquitoes

The combination of Hurricane Irma (September 11-12, 2017) and a mild winter have ensured that mosquitoes will be a <u>HUGE</u> problem for Brookhaven this summer. July 2017 reported a confirmed contraction of Zika in Brookhaven. The Centers for Disease Control (<u>CDC</u>) has our attention about mosquitoes through news of the Zika virus outbreak. It is important for us to reduce mosquito breeding sites, and to take precautions while working or playing outdoors to prevent unpleasant bites and illness. Several mosquito species can transmit diseases to humans (e.g., West Nile and Chikungunya viruses, and Eastern Equine and LaCrosse Encephalitis) and can transmit heartworms to dogs.

Nearly <u>60 species</u> of mosquitoes live in Georgia, and their habits and characteristics vary. Both males and females drink nectar and plant juices, and are plant pollinators. Only females supplement their diet with blood, needed for egg production.

Some species breed in permanent ponds or wetlands; other species breed in temporary waters that collect in objects around our homes or in flooded areas.

Mosquitoes can breed in just one teaspoon of water, so **drain** or **treat** standing water in and around your home for comfort and health while enjoying your yard. The CDC also recommends that while you are outdoors, you wear protective clothing and use EPA- registered insect repellants **according to directions**.

10 Top Tips

to keep your yard mosquito-free!

- 1. Empty & throw away or recycle old bottles, cans and plastic containers.
- 2. Clean gutters to allow proper drainage.
- 3. Turn buckets, baby pools, and boats upside down when not in use.

 Check rims and indentations weekly.
- 4. Change water in birdbaths, ornamental ponds and fountains at least once a week. Aeration also helps.
- 5. Tightly cover rain barrels and open ends of drainage pipes with fine meshed screen.
- 6. Wash and take old tires to a tire dropoff location for recycling.
- 7. Fill tree holes or place Bti inside where water collects.
- 8. Empty water from outside containers such as flowerpots, vases, dishes.
- Repair leaky water faucets, hoses and air conditioners to avoid stagnant puddles.
- 10. Clean excess vegetation from ponds and stock them with fish.



Non-toxic, inexpensive BTi is your best friend!

Bacillus thuringiensis israelensis (Bti) is a biological mosquito larvicide that targets mosquito and black fly larvae without harming humans, pets, amphibians, dragonflies, fish or birds. Found commercially in rings (dunks) or bits, you can safely treat unused swimming pools, wet areas, rain barrels, tree holes, or storm drain inlets. A full ring treats up to 100 sq. ft. and slowly releases for 30 days. "Bits" work immediately but for only a week or two. Bti products are available at home and garden stores or online. You can apply BTi in yard inlets or hang dunks from grates. Remove debris first if you can. Repeat after rain.

Rain Barrel Maintenance

Raise barrel on concrete blocks or sturdy foundation. Secure well to prevent tipping. Drain overflow at least 5' from the house. Replace torn screens and keep lids tight.





Mosquitoes will not breed in moving water or in areas that hold water less than a week.


Does Your HOA or property have Stormwater Control Measures (SCMs)?

SCMs (grassy swales, ponds, bioretention, etc.) are designed to avoid mosquito problems by draining within 3-5 days, or if in permanently wet conditions, through ecological balance with fish and other aquatic organisms that eat mosquito larvae.

Maintenance is required to keep SCMs functioning well and mosquitofree. Routine inspections are required several times per year and after each storm with more than one inch of rain. Guidance is available in the Georgia Stormwater Management Manual at

Mosquito Life Cycle (Aedes spp.)

- Females of Aedes mosquitoes lay eggs above the waterline on containers holding water. Eggs are sticky and can survive without water for 8 months.
- Once submerged, eggs hatch into larvae. The larval stage lasts about 5 days. Larvae eat microorganisms in the water, molt three times before becoming pupae.
- Pupae develop in 2-3 days.
- Adults emerge from the pupae. They will stay within a small territory, but those from your yard WILL bother neighbors!

The City of Brookhaven Stormwater Management Crew monitors public land for mosquito outbreaks. They also sweep the streets regularly and maintain storm drains in public right-of-ways on a routine basis to remove debris where mosquitoes may lay eggs.
