Brookhaven Parks & Recreation introduces in-house maintenance division

A crisp spring morning at Blackburn Park was the perfect setting to welcome the City of Brookhaven's newest staff members- a 17-member parks operations maintenance crew. To save money and maintain better quality control, the Brookhaven Parks & Recreation Department hired in-house staff in lieu of contractors to take care of the City's parks, recreation facilities, right-of-way and FEMA properties.

"Having a permanent crew rather than contractors not only allows us to save money, it gives the City better control of the quality of work being performed, and we have a lot more flexibility to deal with any issues that come up. We won't have to wait on amending contracts; we can get right to work," said Parks & Recreation Director Brian Borden.

The new 17-member Parks Operations Division includes three crew leaders and an operations manager and supervisor. The team is responsible for an array of tasks, including park landscaping, mowing, trimming, repairs, minor construction, and trash duties.

"I am so proud to welcome these professionals into the Brookhaven family," said Mayor John Ernst. "We have high standards, and this move to an in-house staff will help us keep up to the task of maintaining our parks - a major point of pride in this City."

After a one-time capital cost of around \$300,000 to establish the division and purchase equipment, the move is expected to save the City about \$300,000 a year.

"I am excited about how these men and women being on site every day will not only increase beautification throughout all our parks, but also bring greater community awareness of what we do," said District 1 Councilwoman Linley Jones. "I can't wait to see Brookhaven blossom even more under their care."

Help tell Brookhaven's story with the City's new history project

Brookhaven is seeking to catalog historical sites in the City and is asking for public input to help with this project.

"From our very own Lynwood Recreation Center that was the site of an historic desegregation, to locations like China Grove Missionary First Baptist Church which just celebrated its 100th anniversary, this City has a rich history that needs to be catalogued," said Community Development Director Patrice Ruffin. "We're asking the public for its help in identifying the sites that make up the historic fabric of Brookhaven."

The City has launched a website at **www.BrookhavenGA**. **gov/commdev/page/brookhaven-historic-resources** that includes a portal to a historical "story map" compiled by the City's Community Development and GIS departments, an online tool where residents can input historical information on an interactive map, and a list of other historical resources.

The website's creation follows some other steps the City has taken to note its history. In October 2020, the City Council approved an official historic designation for Lynwood Park and its community, and in 2015 the book "Images of America: Brookhaven" was commissioned by the City and former Mayor Rebecca Chase Williams.

In the future, Ruffin says the Community Development Department hopes to contract with a historian to chronicle Brookhaven's incorporation efforts and its first 10 years.

"I think having our history written down is extremely important for the City's future operations," said Brookhaven Mayor John Ernst. "Plus, there's just a lot of great stories to document."



Bringing the community's vision to a City park near you

The City of Brookhaven is home to more than 300 acres of the most beautiful parkland in Metro Atlanta. With aquatics, hiking, sports facilities and playgrounds, Brookhaven's parks truly offer something for everyone. In November 2018, residents approved the Parks Bond referendum to authorize up to \$40 million in capital improvements to Brookhaven parks and facilities.

More than two and half years later, we're excited to share the progress we've made in parks throughout the City, including how some of the projects have evolved based on community input and onsite conditions. While the pandemic slowed down some of the work, new amenities have been opening and are available for the community's enjoyment this summer and beyond.

Did you know?

Projects included in the 2018 Park Bond Program were identified in the 2016 Parks Master Plans developed through an extensive community engagement process. The Bond Program funds improvements from six of the 10 master plans.

Park Bond Program Management

Jacobs was contracted as the Park Bond Program Manager and CPL (Clark, Patterson, Lee) and Lose Design were contracted to complete design for the six parks in the program.

The Park Bond Oversight Committee

The Park Bond Oversight Committee was appointed by Mayor and Council in 2019 to offer citizen input and review of the Bond Program. The five-member group started with an initial review of the master plans for individual parks and the beginning of construction documents to confirm compliance with the Park Bond. The committee continues to meet regularly to review Program updates and plans.

Ashford Park Bond Funding: \$1,943,954 Completed Summer 2021

Highlights for the park include a family friendly splashpad featuring a colorful soft surface with waterjets and sprays plus granite columns and seat walls that can double as stage area. A new pavilion/picnic shelter now sits atop the hill just beyond the splashpad.

Other improvements under the Park Bond Program include:

- Site drainage and grading
- New boardwalk across drainage swale
- Sidewalk and stairs to the new pavilion
- New decorative fence to replace chain link perimeter fence









Blackburn Park Bond Funding: \$1,279,810 Completed Fall 2020 (Phase 1)

Marquee fencing featuring granite columns along Ashford Dunwoody Road was completed in August 2019. The entire parking lot was renovated by October 2020 taking care to preserve and reuse granite curbs and save a large oak tree (50" diameter). The roots had grown into the pavement along the soccer field, so the drive was realigned to keep traffic off the roots and restore a travel lane. Saving the tree required special arborist care, which was also used to save a 34" oak tree at the playground.

Other improvements under the Park Bond Program include:

- Bioretention pond for stormwater management with landscaping
- Phase 2 parking improvements on Donaldson Drive to be completed later this year

Brookhaven Park Bond Funding: \$6,000,000

Planned improvements to Brookhaven Park include:

- New dog park pavilion with patio and restrooms
- New playground with a pavilion and restrooms
- Large group pavilion
- Reconstructed parking lot

City improvements are pending discussions and agreements with DeKalb County.



Briarwood Park Bond Funding: \$7,013,100 Completed Fall 2020 (Phase 1 – Pool)

Memorial Day weekend marked the season opening of the new Briarwood Park Pool. Originally planned as a renovation in the bond referendum, early planning and design determined it would need to be fully replaced to bring the pool and pool house up to current codes and standards. A special "ground cracking" event in October 2019 kicked off construction, which continued into 2020. Despite the impacts of the pandemic and other construction variables, the pool featuring competitive and recreational sections opened for the first time on Sept. 12, 2020.





The 75-foot long competitive side includes six lanes for swim teams and lap swimmers, and the zero-entry recreational side includes spray features. The new 4,000 square foot pool house includes restrooms, locker rooms, concessions, ticket office, and a lifeguard room.

Phase 2 improvements will include other master plan items such as:

- Community garden and new pavilion
- Parking lot improvements
- Tennis court seating and pavilion
- Multi-use trail with boardwalk and bridges

Lynwood Park Bond Funding: \$10,977,393 Timeline: Summer 2022

The Lynwood Park Master Plan was updated in 2019 to include a splash pad and zero-entry pool along with a lap pool. Residents attending a January 2020 Town Hall supported the change to a splashpad and also shared concerns about limited parking.



In response, the main parking lot was expanded, and additional parking was added off Mendell Circle. Council affirmed the amended master plan on Jan. 28, 2020.

Changes to the City's stormwater ordinance and site conditions resulted in the need for additional stormwater management design to include underground detention. The splashpad and pool are scheduled for completion to open for the Summer of 2022 swim season.

Murphey Candler Park Bond Funding: \$8,984,138 Timeline: In progress

Murphey Candler Park's master plan features a variety of improvements. Some have been completed, others are in progress this summer or will begin in the fall, and a few have a longer timeline for design. Items budgeted for construction under the Bond Program and their status include:

• New South Trail along Nancy Creek (behind the ball fields) – will be concrete and pervious concrete with a new creek crossing for trail users and ball players. Contract for \$443,142.78 awarded in late February. Construction is underway and should be complete later this summer.

- **New Playground in Horseshoe** installation of playground structures was completed this Spring for \$319,930.75 and opened in March 2021.
- Community Green inside Horseshoe an open space lawn area with a perimeter sidewalk, short seat
 walls to terrace the existing grade, entrance area with benches and a bike rack, and a small stage area with
 a seat wall and electrical outlets. The green is envisioned as a space for small gatherings homeschoolers, families, neighborhood groups and is not intended for large groups or concerts. Construction will start
 soon and be completed in the Fall.
- Horseshoe Road improvements will take place to the existing road after Community Green is complete. Gravel parking will be added along the road. Existing gravel parking along Murphey Candler Lake East will be improved with curb and gutter, and sidewalk and access to the playground. No trees will be removed as part of the project.
- North Boardwalk expected to go to construction this Fall. The boardwalk will include overlooks with railings for viewing access across the wetlands at the north end of Murphey Candler Lake.
- **Multi-Use Trail on Dam** the widened dam sidewalk will provide better access and feature new overlooks. Plans are currently in review by the GA Environmental Protection Division (EPD) Safe Dams Program. Construction is planned to start in the Fall.
- **Pool Parking Lots Improvements –** includes a reconstructed north parking lot that adds 30 new spaces and a repaved south lot with new curb and gutter to improve drainage. A sidewalk will be added from the pool lot to the playground lot just to the south. Construction is planned for September 2021 after the pool closes for the season.
- Scout Hut Demolition Plans are to remove the building this fall to provide room for improved parking for the Lake House and ball fields.
- Lake House with Expanded Parking \$1.25 million was earmarked for a community center at the park under the Bond Program. After a robust 10-month long public input process that continued virtually after COVID-19, the City affirmed the Lake House concept with 100 parking spaces at its April 27, 2021, meeting. The Public Input Report detailing various in-person and virtual feedback opportunities as well as the volume and nature of comments received and how the project evolved in response are available on the Parks Bond web page. Detailed design will be ongoing through the year to allow for construction in 2022.

Conservancy planting event adds 18 trees to Brookhaven Park Grants from Park Pride and City of Brookhaven help fund the effort

March 20 was the first day of the spring season and in one of the City's crown jewels, Brookhaven Park, Mother Nature got a helping hand from a group of volunteers who spent the morning adding 18 trees to the park's landscape.

The community tree planting project was spearheaded by the Brookhaven Park Conservancy and primarily funded by two grants from Park Pride of Atlanta (\$2,500) and the City of Brookhaven (\$3,000) to help plant evergreen screening trees next to an adjoining neighborhood. The value of all project costs, including volunteer labor, trees, planting supplies and equipment, exceeded \$20,000, a significant investment to improve Brookhaven Park.

Gathering along a winding walkway on the west side of Brookhaven Park's dog run, the group, under the direction of Justin Viens, Conservancy board member and president of Southern Gardener Landscape and Design, received instruction on how to properly plant the trees. The Conservancy had contracted to pre-dig the holes to save time, and a generous donation from 8 • Brookhaven City News • Summer 2021 Lowe's Chamblee provided water buckets, top soil, mulch, and fertilizer for the project. Southern Gardner, using some of the grant funding, had sourced the trees from a South Georgia nursery, and the company absorbed the cost of transporting and delivering the trees to the park for planting.

"The trees we selected were Little Gem magnolias and Green Giant arborvitae," said Viens. "These are both hardy screening trees. The magnolias grow well in shady locations and the arborvitae in sunnier locations. They are expected to grow about four-to-five feet a year and should reach a height of about 40'. We like to refer to plantings like this as 'green naturalization' that will provide a screening wall between the park and the homes behind it, intermingled with other trees to add to the density of the wall."

When planting trees like this, Viens added, one should keep in mind the phrase "Sleep, Creep, and Leap." The first year, the tree will sleep—it may not grow much above ground while its roots develop and establish. The second to third year, the tree will creep—

it will begin to grow a little as it settles into its space. The third to fourth year, the tree will leap in size, as it has established itself and begins to thrive. The newly planted trees at Brookhaven Park, have a good jump on the "sleep" aspect in that they are already about eightto-10 feet tall.

Regarding the tree planting project, Brookhaven City Councilwoman Madeleine Simmons commented, "I am so thankful to the Brookhaven Park Conservancy, Park Pride, the Boy Scouts, Lowe's and the City for coming together on this important tree planting initiative in Brookhaven Park's wooded area, a cherished natural oasis in the center of our City. This was the second major tree planting initiative from the community volunteers with Brookhaven Park Conservancy, and the addition of these new trees will benefit Brookhaven's tree canopy and Brookhaven Park's visitors for decades to come. Thank you to all who volunteered in making this great project possible."

"We are extremely grateful for all of the effort by the Brookhaven Park Conservancy, Park Pride and other members of the Parks and Recreation Coalition Brookhaven (PARC) to communicate, promote and encourage use and improvement of our City parks," said Brookhaven Mayor John Ernst. "PARC Brookhaven is an organization of representatives from all parks in the City of Brookhaven, and their goal is to work with citizens, elected officials and City staff to create world class parks and recreation in Brookhaven for the benefit of its citizens and park users." Twelve City of Brookhaven park organizations, including the Brookhaven Park Conservancy, are active in PARC Brookhaven.

Also instrumental to the success of the tree planting project were Boy Scout Troop 379 members from St. Martin's Episcopal School. Assistant Scoutmaster Jay Schmitt noted, "Troop 379 is thrilled to be included in this effort to plant new trees. We hope our efforts will improve the park for all to enjoy, a truly unique peaceful place in a busy city. Several of our Eagle Scout candidates are working on individual projects to help improve the park." Several of those pending projects include installation of public information kiosks in the park and the construction of birdhouses suitable to put in the park for bluebirds, owls and swifts.

Kroger Brookhaven's manager Nigel Vereen donated water and other refreshments for the tree planting volunteers. "We are always grateful to companies like Lowe's and Kroger for their donations," said Conservancy board member Mike Elliot. "These folks are always supportive of our efforts and don't ever hesitate to provide items for us."

Élliot added that the March 20 tree planting was the second major planting project the Conservancy had spearheaded for the park in the past five years. "When the Gables Brookhaven project was developed near Town Brookhaven at Hermance Drive, we coordinated the spading and removal of 22 mature, mostly oak, trees from that property. The 15-20-foot trees were like installing an instant forest that helped create a treelined pathway in the park."

Over the past decade or more, even pre-dating the incorporation of Brookhaven as a city, the Brookhaven Park Conservancy has provided much-needed upgrades to the park. Since the City was created in 2012, the group has worked in tandem with the Brookhaven Parks and Recreation team on projects ranging from mulching, flower planting, painting picnic tables, helping restore a park pavilion, and invasive tree removal and brush cleanup, to name just a few.

"We are happy to be making progress improving Brookhaven Park's ecology with substantial and much-needed trees. Many thanks to Park Pride and the City of Brookhaven for the funds to get us started," said Thad Ellett, President of Brookhaven Park Conservancy.
