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Applicable Plans Overview

Since its incorporation in 2012, the City of Brookhaven has adopted four plans that fulfill the entry requirements of the LCI program for the Buford Highway Corridor study area:

- The Buford Highway Improvement Plan and Economic Development Strategy ("BHIP"), published in 2014;
- Comprehensive Plan 2034, published in 2014 and last amended in 2016;
- The Bicycle, Pedestrian, & Trail Plan, published in 2016; and
- The Peachtree Creek Greenway Master Plan, published in 2016.

Applicable Plans' Scope of Work

While the study areas of the BHIP, Comprehensive Plan, and Bicycle, Pedestrian, & Trail Plan include the entirety of the City, each includes a specific assessment of the needs and opportunities related to the LCI Study Goals within the Buford Highway Corridor. The entire study area of the Greenway Master Plan falls within the Buford Highway Corridor area.

The combined scope of work of these plans is on par with that required for LCI eligibility. Each plan includes in-depth analysis of existing conditions, goal and objective development, and work program creation. Public participation and input is a key component of each plan.

BHIP: Studies the Buford Highway corridor with a goal of providing "an attractive, safe and trafficable environment, with an emphasis on pedestrian accessibility and an action plan to stimulate the area to its full potential and long range sustainability" (p. 1). The study includes a physical and market analysis of current conditions, "including an assessment of pedestrian and vehicular circulation, open space [and] character defining features" and the creation of a development strategy (p. 1-2).

accommodating all active transportation users through a combination of technical analysis, best practices in planning, and engagement with the community" (p. 1-3).

Comprehensive Plan: Presents and guides the City's long-term future vision, including land use, community facilities and resources, economic development, housing, population, and transportation. Includes goals and policies for the development of the Buford Highway Character Area.

Greenway Master Plan: Aims "to realize the development of a multi-purpose linear park along the North Fork of Peachtree Creek", which runs through the Corridor roughly parallel to Buford Highway. The plan includes a detailed analysis of existing conditions, a proposed Greenway Master Plan, and an implementation strategy (p. 1).



Community Needs

Eligibility for the LCI program would address several needs in the Buford Highway Corridor community, including improvements bicycle and pedestrian facilities, safe access to transit, inter-parcel connectivity, streetscape aesthetics, and economic development.

The **BHIP**'s in-depth study of the corridor includes recommendations to reduce Buford Highway's speed limit, narrow the road profile, add protected medians, provide signalized mid-block crosswalks, construct on- and



off-road bicycle infrastructure, and install street trees and buffer plantings. Lightning, street furniture, and bus stop improvements are also recommended (BHIP p. 7-20).

The **Bicycle**, **Pedestrian and Trail Plan** echoes the recommendations of the BHIP and includes design, maintenance, and zoning policy guidelines to address these community needs. Projects include filling sidewalk gaps, bicycle infrastructure, pedestrian crossing signals, wayfinding signage, and zoning ordinance amendments to allow for multi-use trail connectivity (p. 1-8).

The **Comprehensive Plan** guides future development toward a "transition from an auto-oriented suburban corridor into a denser, more walkable urban corridor, that features compact pedestrian-friendly development" (Ch. 3, p. 72). Implementation strategies include design guidelines, streetscape standards and an overlay district for the corridor (Ch. 5, p. 91; Work Program p. 1).

The **Greenway Master Plan** further addresses these community needs by laying the groundwork for a trail system that "would provide critical connectivity between parcels" while improving bicycle and pedestrian access through the Buford Highway Corridor area.

Support of regional goals established in the Atlanta Region's Plan Policy Framework

The plans each support the goal of "developing additional walkable, vibrant centers that support people of all ages and abilities" (p. 13) through work items for improved multi-modal transportation infrastructure and connectivity. Recommendations include the development of the Greenway, installation of bicycle and pedestrian facilities throughout the corridor, improved transit access, and ordinance changes to promote connectivity.

The Greenway Plan and Bicycle, Pedestrian & Trail Plan support the regional goal to "promote health, arts, and other aspects of a high quality of life" (p. 21) and objectives to "improve public health through the built environment", "integrate sound environmental management principles that ensure the region's sustainability", and "promote the use of creative placemaking to build and maintain the character of communities."

Prior activities supporting quality growth and complete streets principles and applicant's commitment and ability to support the proposed plan

The City's adoption of each of these four plans shows strong support of quality growth and complete streets principles. The BHIP's "Buford Boulevard" recommendations are reflective of complete streets principles (p. 12-15). The City has begun to implement work program items for improvements along Buford Highway, including pedestrian amenities and medians. The Bicycle, Pedestrian, & Trail Plan recommends that "the City

of Brookhaven create and adopt a Complete Streets policy" (p. 3). The Comprehensive Plan consistently encourages quality growth principles, including in the Community Goals for the Buford Highway Character Area (Ch. 3, p. 72-74). Finally, a stated goal of the Greenway Master Plan is to provide "an opportunity ... to advocate for the creation of complete streets, catering to the needs and safety of pedestrians and cyclists in addition to the car" (p. 26).



The City's adoption of the Brookhaven-Peachtree Overlay District ordinance is another example of a commitment to complete streets and quality growth. The Overlay ordinance requires all new streets are required to connect to at least two public streets, and new developments are required to provide wide sidewalks with landscape zones, street trees, and bicycle parking. Overlay regulations support the quality growth through the encouragement of transit-oriented development and walkability.

Studies' support of LCI objectives

a. Encourage a diversity of housing, employment, commercial, shopping, and recreation uses within the study area that are accessible by people of all ages, abilities, and income levels:

The BHIP includes site-specific strategies for a diversity of housing, commercial, and shopping development throughout the corridor, with a focus on "one-for-one" replacement of existing affordable housing (p. 25-31). Streetscape and multi-modal transportation improvements recommended by the plan encourage accessibility for all.

The Comprehensive Plan encourages the preservation of "the diversity of the area by promoting international businesses and the variety of housing types and price points through inclusionary zoning techniques" (Ch. 3, p. 73).

The Greenway Plan and Bicycle, Pedestrian & Trail Plan both include a variety of specific work items and policy recommendations for improving accessible recreational opportunities throughout the corridor.

b. Enhance access to a range of travel modes such as transit, roadways, walking and biking or increase street connectivity that provides optimal access to all uses and disperse trips within the study area: The BHIP, Greenway Plan, and Bicycle, Pedestrian & Trail Plan each includes specific, complementary strategies for improving walkability, bikeability, and transit access throughout the corridor. Bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure and the improved connectivity are prioritized throughout these plans. The Comprehensive Plan also promotes development that aides in Buford Highway's "transition from an auto-oriented suburban corridor into a denser, more walkable urban corridor that features compact pedestrian-friendly development" (Ch. 3, p. 72).

c. Foster public-private partnerships and sustained community support through an outreach process that promotes the involvement of all stakeholders, including those historically underserved or underrepresented:

Each of these plans encourages maintaining the diversity and affordability of housing options in the area, increasing park space, and improving transportation options. The City has established an Affordable Housing Task Force and worked with Peachtree Creek Greenway, Inc., to further these goals.

d. Advance other LCI Priorities, such as, preservation of historic districts, building and community character; aging-in-place/livelong community concepts; creative placemaking; brownfield or grayfield redevelopment; transit-oriented development; mixed-income and workforce housing; Travel Demand Management (TDM), economic development or the incorporation of Smart City Transportation investments:

Both the BHIP and Comprehensive Plan place an emphasis on the preserving the unique character of the Buford Highway Corridor. The BHIP's analysis was "aimed at retaining one-for-one affordable housing opportunities" (p. 27), while the Comprehensive Plan states that the City should "strive to balance opportunities for . . . redevelopment and economic investment with the desire to preserve and maintain affordable housing options and cultural diversity" (Ch. 3, p. 72).

The Metropolitan Atlanta Rapid Transit Authority (MARTA) is pleased to support the City of Brookhaven's application for Livable Centers Initiative (LCI) planning funds for the Buford Highway Corridor.

MARTA currently operates Route 39 along the Buford Highway Corridor. This is one of our busiest routes and in our approved Comprehensive Operations Analysis has been identified to be converted into an arterial rapid transit corridor which will provide frequent transit service with limited stops, enhanced passenger amenities and improved travel times. In accordance with MARTA's TOD Guidelines, the intent of arterial rapid transit is not solely to improve mobility but to also transform the pattern of land use along these corridors, which contain long stretches of automobile-oriented commercial development and frequent "dead zones".

The success of arterial rapid bus corridors is dependent upon implementation of extensive pedestrian improvements and the attraction of more compact, sustainable and pedestrian-friendly development patterns. The Buford Highway Corridor LCI planning process can provide a framework to help achieve these outcomes.






