1. Introduction

The City of Brookhaven is designated a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) entitlement Community by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). This designation qualifies the City to receive grant funding from the CDBG program administered by HUD. The program allocates annual grants to assist in the development of viable communities by providing decent housing, a suitable living environment, and to expand economic opportunities, principally for low and moderate income (LMI) persons. To receive an annual allocation of federal grant funds from HUD, Brookhaven submitted a five-year Consolidated Plan outlining strategy to support Brookhaven's LMI community from 2021-2025. Additionally, the City drafts and submits a one-year Action Plan annually. Brookhaven's CDBG Program year runs from July 1- June 30.

The Consolidated Plan includes the amount of assistance the City expects to receive during the plan period and the range of activities that may be undertaken including the estimated benefit to persons of low and moderate income. The Annual Action Plans are required to include project or program specifics, such as location, cost, proposed outcome, and any additional descriptive information for each yearly grant award. Primarily, federal regulations require that funds be aimed where the greatest benefit may be attained for LMI residents. To acquire ample public engagement in all aspects and phases of plan development, the City of Brookhaven interacts with various stakeholders in meetings, workshops, public hearings, and with written correspondence. Prior to the adoption of an Annual Action Plan, Brookhaven advertise for two public hearings are held. The first having a minimum 15-day notice, the second a minimum 30-day notice. All comments are recorded and considered in the formulation of the plan. In addition, all comments and responses are included in the appendix of the plan and are forwarded to HUD upon adoption

On June 16, Brookhaven received notice of the 2022 formula allocation of \$336,933. In every effort to make a timely submission of the 2022 Action Plan, the City is relying on extensive 2021 outreach conducted for the Consolidated Plan, holding 2 public hearings on uses for 2022 funding, and receiving and considering comment from all community members. The activities the City has identified for these funds are included in the 2022 Annual Action Plan.

It is also important to note that the Plan, based on data analysis, identified the Local Target Area of Buford Highway consisting of eight census block groups with a combined 87.97% LMI population. Due to limited resources, strategic investment in this corridor encourages sustained improvements. The area's high need was clearly articulated during public engagement and supported by federal data resources. While targeting the area is not intended to preclude projects in other areas of the city, there is intentional focus on this area of highest need.

3. Evaluation of past performance

Additionally, the city identified an alternative funding source for one of the projects considered under the plan and so amended the 2021 Action Plan to reallocate funds from Activity 6) Neighborhood Facilities to Activity 5) Sidewalk reconstruction and ADA compliant curb ramps. Construction on that project is anticipated to begin early in the 2022 Plan Year and will address the timeliness requirement, spending down over 50% of available funds. As a fist year entitlement community staff is conducting research and setting process for the balance of 2021 projects. It is anticipated all will begin in the 2022 Action Plan year.

4. Summary of Citizen Participation Process and consultation process

Summary from citizen participation section of plan.

The City strongly encourages public participation in the development of the 2022 Annual Action Plan (AAP). Per the City's Citizen Participation Plan, the public input and comment period for the plan ran for over 30 days, starting June 10, 2022. All comments were required to be submitted by 5:00 p.m. on July 26, 2022. Public comments could be submitted in writing to the City of Brookhaven Community Development Department ATTN: CDBG Administration 4362 Peachtree Road Brookhaven, GA 30319 or through the City's CDBG Program email: CDBG@BrookhavenGA.gov . On June 10, 2022 a draft plan budget was made available on the City of Brookhaven CDBG page, and on July 2, 2022 the full DRAFT 2022 Action Plan was published on that page. Both are available at website at https://www.brookhavenga.gov/commdev/page/community-development-block-grant-program

Hard copies of notices and the DRAFT plan were made available at Brookhaven City Hall. Requests for hard copies are be made through CDBG@BrookhavenGA.gov or calling 404-637-0500 and requesting CDBG Administration information. Covid-19 stressors continued to hamper in-person meetings however, throughout the year and during the plan development period, staff consulted with agency partners, tenant advocates, public safety providers, DeKalb County Continuum of Care to inform development of the 2022 Action Plan.

In addition, the public had the opportunity to comment or review the plan and comment at Public Hearings on Tuesday June Tuesday July 28 and Tuesday July 26, 2022 at 7:00 p.m. at the regular City of Brookhaven City Council Meeting. Announcements for public hearings and request for input were made at City Council meetings, broadcast on Facebook and via Zoom, on May 10, May 24, June 14, June 28 and July 26, 2022. The final plan, including a summary of public comment, was adopted at the City of Brookhaven City Council Meeting on August 9, 2022.

Advertisements announcing availability of resources and public hearing dates in the <u>Atlanta Journal Constitution</u> and <u>Hispanico Mundo</u> are attached. Screen shots of the CDBG pages with further explanation and draft plan are also included as attachments.

Hearings were scheduled for June 28 and July 26, 2022. Written public comment closed July 25 and open comments were accepted on July 26, 2022.

The draft plan was posted to the City of Brookhaven CDBG website on June 10, updated on July 2, and made available at City Hall. Comments were welcome in-person, via phone, and via email at CDBG@BrookhavenGA.gov

1. Introduction

The 2022 Action Plan represents Brookhaven's first following extensive outreach for the 2021-25 Consolidated Plan. Throughout a year heavily impacted by COVID-19 stressors, including staff impacts at public service agencies, the City found that direct meetings throughout the program year to solicit ongoing recommendations for the development of the 2022 Action Plan were most effective. City staff met regularly with the Salvation Army, St. Vincent DePaul, Goodwill of North Georgia, the Center for Pan Asian Community Services, the Latin American Association, and the Center for Pan Asian Community Services. Among our stakeholders there was strong support for moving forward with the Consolidated Plan they were so instrumental in developing and using the plan to increase funding for Activities identified and funded in the 2021 Action Plan. Code Enforcement and Police Officers who meet regularly with low/mod income households advocated for funding for additional public safety outreach and continued targeted code enforcement and tenant education. Based on this input and staff recommendation for construction projects that will repair long-neglected infrastructure in the Buford Hwy Target Area the 2021 Action Plan was developed. Outreach including advertising of public meetings in English and in Spanish and posting of the proposed plan from June 10 through July 26, 2022 per the Citizen Participation plan.

Provide a concise summary of the jurisdiction's activities to enhance coordination between public and assisted housing providers and private and governmental health, mental health and service agencies (91.215(I))

DeKalb County is charged with providing public and assisted housing, as well as governmental health and mental health services. In 2021 the city worked with County staff and private agencies in order to provide aid where there were gaps.

DeKalb County does not operate public housing the City of Brookhaven. The City's participation in the Continuum of Care should provide additional opportunity to identify potential partnerships on housing as well as homelessness. While the housing authority has no public housing units in Brookhaven, they do support the residents living in assisted housing and those with housing choice vouchers. The family self- sufficiency (FSS) program is a voluntary program available to current housing choice voucher residents, which is designed to assist families in becoming independent of public assistance. The program includes case management services, and assists families with education, career counseling, job searches, mental and physical health issues, money management, childcare and other needs. The housing authority also supports homeownership opportunities through the Homeownership Voucher Program, which offers a mortgage subsidy for those who desire to purchase a home. Lastly, the Resident Services Corporation (RSC) provides special programs and resident services that link the family to community-based service providers to help them become more stable in various areas of their lives.

The Brookhaven Police Department increased their mental health responder staff from 1 to 2 and strives to have a mental health response on all calls, to de-escalate, evaluate, and direct patients to medical facilities rather than charge and/or arrest. The Department coordinates care with the Dekalb County and regional healthcare providers.

In response to the COVID-19 healthcare crisis, the DeKalb County Board of Health was unable to provide adequate testing, and subsequently vaccination sites. The City of Brookhaven supported efforts by negotiating with the Metropolitan Atlanta Rapid Transit Agency (MARTA) to provide no cost testing at the Brookhaven MARTA station. In addition to investing \$8,355.00 to pay for the free service, the City provided traffic management at the height of demand.

Describe coordination with the Continuum of Care and efforts to address the needs of homeless persons (particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans, and unaccompanied youth) and persons at risk of homelessness.

The City attended sessions in order to educate staff on the structure and county resources, specifically the DeKalb continuum of Care, and understanding it's role in addressing needs in Brookhaven. Ongoing, staff attends their meetings and planning sessions in order to integrate Brookhaven needs and build partnerships into future strategies. The City will continue to work with agency partners, specifically Goodwill, the Salvation Army, the Latin American Association, and the Center for Pan Asian Comunity Services to identify families at risk of homeless and coordinate support. Brookhaven partners with the Salvation Army to provide outreach and connect homeless populations to housing, medical, and mental health services. In this process, every effort is made to identify veterans as connections are made. It is the experience thus far that families with children do not tend to shelter in Brookhaven however special care is taken to locate any families and connect to services. If services are declined, the City works to establish relationships, performs wellness checks and continues to offer connection to services. In both 2021 and 2022 Action Plan Activities, this program is formalized to provide data and accomplishments.

The City of Brookahven does not receive ESG funds. That is a DeKalb County function however as Brookhaven staff is integrated into the Continuum of Care opportunities to access these resources controlled by the County.

1. Summary of citizen participation process/Efforts made to broaden citizen participation Summarize citizen participation process and how it impacted goal-setting

Throughout a year heavily impacted by COVID-19 stressors, including staff impacts at public service agencies, the City found that direct meetings throughout the program year to solicit ongoing recommendations for the development of the 2022 Action Plan were most effective. City staff met or partnered with staff and volunteers at the Salvation Army, St. Vincent DePaul, Goodwill of North Georgia, the Center for Pan Asian Community Services, the Latin American Association, Los Vecinos de Buford Highway, and the Center for Pan Asian Community Services and made them aware of CDBG programs, plans and the need for community input. The City posted the budget and plan for over 30 days and held 2 public hearings as noted in the Community Outreach portion of the Action Plan. Plan Development and meetings were advertised in English speaking and Spanish speaking media.

Despite this outreach, the City received no public comments. It is our assumption that stakeholders were more comfortable meeting directly with staff as strong relationships exist between our Community Development, Strategic Partnerships, and Community Outreach/Communications Departments and our service providers. Additionally, reduced staffing and turnover, combined with COVID-19 stressors simply reduced the amount of time agency staff could devote to the development of the 2022 Plan. City staff who coordinate regularly with supporting agencies reviewed the proposed budget and activities, made recommendations and shared as appropriate. Council twice reviewed the plan in light of their regular experience within the community. Constituents seemed satisfied with the outcome of the extensive outreach conducted for the 2021-25 Consolidated Plan and regular staff outreach. As a result, goal setting is consistent with the 2021 Action Plan and the 2021 Consolidated Plan.

Noting the low participation, a portion of the 2022 administrative funds will be directed towards increasing and receiving regular feedback on Activities and Outcomes in the 2022 Plan Year as it is anticipated that the balance of 2021 and 2022 Activities will be carried out in that timeframe. The City anticipates that a normalization during this year, completion of activities and earlier, aggressive outreach will stimulate increased participation going forward.

Given the intense staffing required for public service projects, and housing repair outreach and subcontracting, the City focused the bulk of 2022 funding on needed public infrastructure funding in the identified Buford Highway Target area. The high need in those low/mod households and businesses is the Consolidated Plan ane was amplified by numerous community members, school officials, and not-for-profit representatives in the CP process. Obstacles to addressing udnerserved needs are primarily communication and trust with our must vulnerable households. The plan included a combined \$15,000 towards targeted code enforcement, education, and public safety outreach in order to repair and rebuild community trust.

Discussion

The city plans to continue its partnerships with area non-profit agencies to reduce homelessness and improve the lives of Brookhaven's low- and moderate-income residents. Through its targeted coe enforcement, housing programs and partnerships, the city estimates 10 housing units will be improved.

The City's goal in the 2022 Action Plan is to provide services and resources to prevent homelessness and improve the quality of lower cost housing through enforcement and sustainable living environment.

AP-60 Public Housing – 91.220(h)

Introduction

The DeKalb County Public Housing Authority (PHA) is responsible for the administration of public housing and the housing choice voucher program. There are no public housing units in Brookhaven. Additionally, the PHA manages approximately 235 Housing Choice Vouchers within Brookhaven. The waiting list for vouchers is currently closed. The PHA is listed as troubled.

Actions planned during the next year to address the needs to public housing

While there is no Public Housing in Brookhaven, the City recognizes the need for increased vouchers or public housing opportunity and intends to meet with the PHA and Georgia Department of Community Affairs to advocate for investment and solutions.

Actions to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

The DeKalb County Development Authority and its affiliate, **Resident Services Corporation (RSC)**, provide resident services and linkages to community-based service providers whom we partner with to provide social services and enrichment programs. Our overarching goal is to help individuals and families become more stable in various areas of their lives where they are having difficulty accessing or affording the support they need to be successful. Resident Services programs and activities focus on community engagement, economic growth and financial stability, health and well-being, and self-sufficiency opportunities for all residents.

The DeKalb Economic Development Authority, Decide DeKalb offers up to 4% down payment assistance to qualified home buyers. The Georgia Department of Community Affairs includes DeKalb County as a qualified location and offers up to \$5,000 in down payment assistance and directs to plans offering an additional \$2,500 to qualified buyers.

If the PHA is designated as troubled, describe the manner in which financial assistance will be provided or other assistance

City of Brookhaven CDBG funds are not sufficient to provide financial assistance to Dekalb Public Housing Authority. The City will work with the Authority to partner on education and services available to Brookhaven residents.

Discussion

There is great need for additional subsidized units in the City of Brookhaven to meet the needs of its most financially vulnerable residents. The costs to construct these units far exceeds the locally available

and seek methods of encouraging affordable construction through ordinance.

AP-65 Homeless and Other Special Needs Activities – 91.220(i) Introduction

The DeKalb County Continuum of Care (CoC) coordinates homeless services and resources within DeKalb County. The City of Brookhaven will partner with the CoC to support area non- profit and faith-based agencies to deliver the needed and necessary services to the homeless and special needs populations.

Describe the jurisdictions one-year goals and actions for reducing and ending homelessness including

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The city will assist local agencies such as The Salvation Army, Latin American Association and Center for Pan Asian Community Services in their efforts to reduce homelessness and prevent families from entering homelessness.

A portion of these populations, such as elderly and physically disabled homeowners, may be assisted through the City's CDBG funded housing rehabilitation program. Outreach efforts are undertaken by a variety of agencies including the Brookhaven Police Department, who work with the individuals and link them with social service providers and services.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

The city will assist local agencies such as The Salvation Army, Latin American Association and Center for Pan Asian Community Services in their efforts to reduce homelessness and link homeless families with shelter through the Continuum of Care coordinated entry system.

Unsheltered homeless residents are connected to the necessary shelter, clothing and food resources within the community through the efforts of the Brookahaven Police Department Community Program.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); or, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs.

Discussion

The City the Brookhaven will continue to support public agencies with CDBG funds to reduce the effects of homelessness and transition homeless individuals into permeant supportive housing. Staff will participate in the DeKalb County Continuum of Care to help ensure a coordinated approach between public agencies and the Consolidated Plan activities.

AP-75 Barriers to affordable housing - 91.220(j)

Introduction:

Over the years, the City of Brookhaven has attempted to eliminate barriers to affordable housing and residential investment. These efforts included amending the zoning code to allow smaller lot development and requiring affordable housing units in developments greater than 10 units.

Actions it planned to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment

The city is committed to removing regulatory barriers to affordable housing. As previous discussed, the city has made great strides in that effort. Moving forward, the city will:

- Continue to provide fair housing enforcement and education outreach
- Annually examine its policies for unintended barriers to affordable housing
- Educate residents on the affordable housing needs within Brookhaven
- Evaluate surplus land that may be used for affordable housing development
- Evaluate tax incentives for new affordable housing

Discussion:

The largest barriers for affordable housing and residential investment are the funding gap to cover the relatively high cost of land and construction, versus the lower sales price or rents that residents can afford. The need for quality affordable housing in Brookhaven far exceeds the community's resources. To that end, the city will continue to work with its partners to acquire external resources necessary to make incremental neighborhood improvements, and the city will continue to strategically invest in housing and community projects that improve the lives of its low- and moderate-income residents.

AP-85 Other Actions – 91.220(k)

Introduction:

Below are additional actions the city will undertake to improve Brookhaven's neighborhoods.

Actions planned to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs

The City will monitor expiring Section 8 contracts and initiate dialogs with those property owners well in advance of the contracts expiring. Additionally, there are planned activities to address mobility challenges, deteriorating properties, and support aging in place through home renovation.

Actions planned to foster and maintain affordable housing

As described in the Consolidated Plan, there are privately owned, subsidized apartment developments that are nearing the end of their Section 8 contracts or LIHTC compliance period. The City will reach out to the property owners and see what assistance may be necessary to keep the units within the affordable housing inventory. The City will also monitor expiring Section 8 contracts and initiate dialogs with those property owners well in advance of the contracts expiring.

Actions planned to reduce lead-based paint hazards

The City will address lead-based paint hazards in properties that receive CDBG funds. Additionally, the city will identify neighborhoods where children could be at high risk for lead poisoning and provide education and outreach to those families. The city will also seek additional funding to remove lead-based paint hazards in units with young children and expand the inventory of lead safe housing units

Actions planned to reduce the number of poverty-level families

The City of Brookhaven has a multi-pronged anti-poverty strategy. The first component is to address the affordability of housing in the community; the second is to support social service agencies providing services to Brookhaven; and the third is providing support to educational and job training programs targeted to low-income residents.

SOCIAL SERVICES

The city will work with local partner agencies to address social services needs for the community. This assistance, whether in direct financial assistance, case management, or education, will help low- and moderate-income clients improve their living conditions and make changes to their situation that will hopefully lead them out of poverty.

JOB TRAINING AND EDUCATION

As outlined in the Consolidated Plan and funded in the 2021 Action Plab, the City will fund workforce development and employment training programs. These activities help provide the skills and education necessary for clients to obtain the types of skilled employment that can provide higher wages than existing low-wage unskilled jobs.

Actions planned to develop institutional structure

The Community Development Department is charged with planning, administering, and completion of the CDBG funded projects. The Department works very closely with local partner agencies to undertake the many projects and priorities of the community. The city could not complete these tasks alone and relies on community support to meet the goals and objectives of the Consolidated Plan and the CDBG program. In 2021 Administrative funds were used entirely to develop the Consolidated Plan, Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing and the 2021 Action Plan. In 2022 administrative funds will be available to allow staffing to implement both the 2021 and 2022 Action plans fully.

An identified gap in the institutional structure is the efficient and complete dissemination of information to the public about programs, activities and opportunities. The city and its partners will improve the access to information, to ensure that residents are aware of the programs and services available to them as they work to improve their lives and neighborhoods.

Actions planned to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies

The city will continue to improve its coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies. The city will use existing processes, such as the Continuum of Care and regional economic development forums, to coordinate among the various public and private agencies, companies and organizations. These efforts should help with ongoing coordination and reduce the likelihood of organizations and partners working at cross purposes.

Discussion:

The city is committed to improving the housing and economic situation of Brookhaven's residents, business owners, and neighborhoods. Through deliberate and intentional actions, the city will work to reduce barriers to affordable housing, increase wealth for low-and moderate-income households, and ensure its residents have access to information about the programs and services available to improve their lives. These actions, coupled with the programs and activities outlined in this Action Plan will lay the foundation for creating neighborhoods of choice, and improving the health of families and communities.

Summary of Public Comments

No public Comments were received by the City of Brookhaven Draft 2022 Action Plan. Despite adherence to the standards of the Citizen Communication Plan the City did not receive comment on the 2022 Action Plan. It is likely this is the result of particularly robust outreach during the Consolidated Plan process in the prior year.

However, staff will re-evaluate as a lack of comment should not be interpreted as a lack of interest. In 2023, the City intends to begin the process earlier, using estimated award amount rather than waiting for the announcement. Additionally, as projects progress from both the 2021 and 2022 Action Plans, the city will announce those projects as CDBG funded in order to educate and engage the community with the program. Finally, the City will reach out to similarly-sized communities in the region for best practices in engaging our citizens.

The City strongly encourages public participation in the development of the 2022 Annual Action Plan (AAP). Saudi golf tour launches

Golfers who played in London ineligible now for PGA events.

ST. ALBANS, ENGLAND - At a distance it looked like a military flypast and Grena-dier Guards trumpeting in a royal-style occasion. Only it wasn't an extension of Queen Elizabeth II's Jubilee celebrations but the launch of the Saudi-funded golf breakaway, attempting to bring a sense of faux regal pageantry to the

rebellion splitting the sport. On a course just outside north London, the band dressed as imitation infantrymen were there to pro-claim the arrival of Dustin Johnson and Phil Mickelson, two of the stars enticed from the PGA Tour to poten-tially earn hundreds of millions of dollars on the LIV

Golf series.
The nine aging planes rumbling overhead helped to mask the lack of significant crowd noise beyond the occa-sional shout of "Let's go Phil"

as he prepared to tee off. At the same time, Thurs-day's message from the PGA Tour was being delivered -

go off. To all the golfers who defected to the renegade series, they now face ban-ishment from future tour events. Johnson had already given up his PGA membership, but Mickelson is not ready to.

The fury of LIV Golf - a product of the Saudi sover-eign wealth fund – was clear, calling the PGA Tour "vindictive" with a decision that will only deepen the divides. There were no signs of the Saudi backing across the Cen-

turion Club, nor any spon-sor branding. Mickelson was sporting a black cap adorned by his personal logo featuring a sil-houette of himself playing golf, replacing the KPMG-branded one that was worn before the corporate spon-sors dropped the deal in February after he disparaged the PGA Tour and Saudi Arabia. Across the course, the only

branding was from LIV Golf and a sparse number of spec-tators in attendance. There was intrigue from those who did turn up, accompanied by a desire to see so many of the world's leading golfers, although none from the

top 10. Charl Schwartzel of South Africa led the field after the

Hudson Swafford, Andy Ogletree among golfers suspended by PGA

His countryman Hennie DuP less was one stroke back in second place. Two golfers – Scott Vincent and Phachara Khongwatmai – are tied for third at 3 under, Mickelson and Johnson are among three golfers tied for seventh place

at I under par.
Unlike many spectators,
Jim Dawkins, who has been coming to golf events for six decades, did pay 67 pounds (\$84) for his pass to the club between Hernel Hempstead and St. Albans.

"I thought as this was the first tournament of the rebel tour it would be interesting to see how it works and who is playing," said the 91-year-old Dawkins, who railed against the PGA Tour banning play-ers. "I've seen an awful lot of changes.

LIV is running curtailed 54-hole, three-day tourna-ments, with a shotgun start seeing players all tee off on different holes. What con-fuses Dawkins is the team element.

The field is split into 12 teams with garish logos and brash names, like Johnson's 4 Aces and Graeme McDowl's Niblicks. "I find this scoreboard dif-

ficult to follow," said Daw-

kins, who traveled from the south of London. "You have got the players up there. I don't know how the teams are set up."

The top three teams share

\$5 million on top of the \$20 million prize fund per event shared between the golfers individually.

To accept the lavish rewards, the players not only had to overcome concerns about being banned from the PGA Tour and events like the Ryder Cup, but also moral doubts.

This is a series viewed as being part of Saudi Arabia's efforts, branded "sportswashing" by human rights groups, to wipe away the stain of the kingdom's abuses.

"It's absolute rubbish, it's just a sport," said Colin Cham-bers, an 80 year-old friend of Dawkins. "When you think about the Chinese, what they do, and we are still happy to go to their Olympics."





In addition, in the case of properties owned and occupied by moderate-income (not low-income) families, an assessment or charge may be made against the property for public improvements financed by a source other than CDBG funds if the jurisdiction certifies that it lacks CDBG funds to cover the assessment.
